

Family Disaster Supplies Kit

There are six basics you should stock in your home: water, food, first aid supplies, clothing, bedding, tools, emergency supplies and special items.

Keep the items that you would most likely need during an evacuation (suggested items are marked with an asterisk *) in an easy-to-carry container such as a covered trash container, back pack or duffle bag.

WATER – Store water in plastic containers such as soft drink bottles. Avoid using containers that will decompose or break, such as milk cartons or glass bottles. A normally active person needs to drink at least two quarts of water each day. Hot environments and intense physical activity can double that amount. Children, nursing mothers and ill people will need more.

- Store one gallon of water per person per day (two quarts for drinking, two quarts for food preparation/sanitation)*
- Keep at least a three-day supply of water for each person (two quarts for drinking, two quarts for each person in your household for food preparation/ sanitation)*

FOOD – Store at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food. Select foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking and little or no water. If you must heat food, pack a can of sterno. Select food items that are compact and lightweight. Include a selection of the following foods in your Disaster Supplies Kit:

- Ready to eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables.
- Canned juices, milk, soup (if powdered, store extra water)
- Staples (sugar, salt, pepper)
- High energy foods – peanuts butter, jelly, crackers, granola bars, and trail mix.
- Vitamins
- Foods for infants, elderly persons or persons on special diets.

- Comfort/stress foods – cookies, hard candy, sweetened cereals, lollipops, instant coffee, and tea bags.

Prescription Drugs

- Prescription drugs taken by all family members.

Non-Prescription Drugs

- Aspirin or non-aspirin pain reliever
- Anti-diarrhea medication
- Antacid (for upset stomach)
- Syrup of ipecac (use to induce vomiting if advised by the Poison Control Center)
- Laxative
- Activated charcoal (use if advised by the Poison Control Center)

FIRST AID KIT – Assemble A first aid kit for your home and one for each car. A first aid kit should include:

- Sterile adhesive bandages in assorted sizes.
- Assorted sized of safety pins
- Cleansing agent/soap
- Latex gloves (2 pairs)
- Sunscreen
- 2- inch sterile gauze pads (4-6)
- 4-inch sterile gauze pads (4-6)
- Hypoallergenic adhesive tape
- Triangular bandages (3)
- 2-inch sterile roller bandages (3 rolls)
- 3-inch sterile roller bandages (3 rolls)
- Scissors
- Tweezers
- Needle
- Moistened towelettes
- Antiseptic
- Thermometer
- Tongue blades (2)
- Tub of petroleum jelly or other lubricant.

Tools & Supplies

- Mess kits, or paper cups, plates and plastic utensils*
- Emergency preparedness manuals*
- Battery operated radio and extra batteries*
- Flashlight and extra batteries*
- Cash or traveler's checks, change*
- Non-electric can opener, utility knife*
- Fire Extinguisher: small canister, ABC type
- Tube tent
- Pliers
- Tape
- Compass
- Matches in a waterproof container

Tools & Supplies

- Aluminum foil
- Plastic storage containers
- Signal Flares
- Paper, pencil
- Needles, thread
- Medicine dropper
- Shut-off wrench, to turn off household gas and water
- Whistle
- Plastic sheeting
- Map of the area (for locating shelters)

Sanitation

- Toilet paper, towelettes *
- Soap, liquid detergent *
- Feminine supplies *
- Personal hygiene items *
- Plastic garbage bages, ties (for personal sanitation uses)
- Plastic bucket with tight lid
- Disinfectant
- Household chlorine bleach

Clothing and Bedding – * Include at least one complete change of clothing and footwear per person.

- Sturdy shoes or work boots*
- Rain Gear*
- Blankets or sleeping bags *
- Hat and gloves
- Thermal underwear
- Sunglasses

Special Items – Remember family members with special needs, such as infants and elderly or disabled persons:

- FOR BABY *
- Formula
 - Diapers

Special Items – cont...

- Bottles
 - Powdered milk
 - Medications
- FOR ADULTS *
- Heart and high blood pressure medication
 - Insulin
 - Prescription drugs
 - Denture needs
 - Contact lenses and supplies
 - Extra eye glasses

Entertainment

- Games
- Books
- Cards

Important Family Documents

- Keep these records in a waterproof, portable container.
- Will, insurance policies, contracts, deeds, stocks and bonds
 - Passport, social security cards, immunizations records.
 - Bank account numbers
 - Credit card account numbers and companies
 - Inventory of valuable household goods,
 - Important phone numbers
 - Family records (Birth certificates, marriage certificates, death certificates.
